2	PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Good morning,
3	and welcome to the Mississippi Board of
4	Nursing. This is our Board meeting.
5	At this time, before we begin, I would
6	like to ask Ms. Lacey Gentry to lead us in
7	prayer.
8	(Invocation)
9	PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: So before we
10	begin this morning, I would like to start
11	with roll call, beginning to my left.
12	Mr. Castilla, if you will, please state
13	your name.

- 7 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: And online on
- 8 Zoom we have Mr. T. J. Adams. Can you state
- 9 your name for us?
- BOARD MEMBER MR. ADAMS: Yes, ma'am.
- 11 T. J. Adams, RN.
- 12 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: At this point,
- 13 I would like to declare a quorum.
- 14 The first item on the agenda is approval
- 15 of the agenda.
- 16 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I make a
- 17 motion we approve the agenda as reported.
- 18 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: I second.
- 19 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in
- 20 favor, say "aye."
- 21 BOARD PANEL: Aye.
- 22 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed?
- 23 (No response)
- 24 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain?
- 25 (No response)

- 1 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: The motion
- 2 moves forward.
- 3 At this point, we will have the open
- 4 forum.
- 5 Do we have anyone from the public that
- 6 would like to speak this morning?
- 7 All right. Moving forward, the
- 8 legislative update.
- 9 Mr. Bobinger?
- 10 MR. BOBINGER: Actually, the Mississippi
- 11 Senate worked up until not long ago this
- 12 morning. Shan, I'm kind of used to them
- 13 leaving early on Friday. I don't like that.
- It's good to see y'all. And as y'all
- 15 might know, we have been very busy around the
- 16 Capitol with healthcare and a lot of other
- 17 issues.
- 18 I'll just start off mentioning the
- 19 Medicaid expansion bill is still alive.
- 20 There's a pretty good gap between the Senate
- 21 and the House position, but it is going to
- 22 conference. So we'll see what comes out of
- 23 that.
- Obviously, a lot of effort was put on
- 25 behalf of, particularly, our professional

- 1 associations, advocating for full-practice
- 2 authority for APRNs. Unfortunately, that bill
- 3 did not come out of the House Committee, Public
- 4 Health Committee. It was brought up for a
- 5 vote. It was a very close vote. Quite
- 6 candidly, there were a couple of folks that
- 7 switched right there at the end, which can
- 8 happen sometimes, especially on a bill like
- 9 this.
- 10 Again, there's support out there for it,
- 11 but I still think there are some
- 12 misunderstandings, quite candidly, about really
- 13 what it does and what it doesn't do. And I
- 14 think there will just be a continuing effort to
- 15 try to educate and better inform those folks
- 16 and let them understand that everything you
- 17 hear is not exactly correct or accurate.
- Anyway, a lot of our associations and,
- 19 certainly, the Board was supportive of the
- 20 people that we regulate and license. But we'll
- 21 continue on that journey.
- I wanted to mention Senate Bill 2080. I'm
- 23 just going to guickly mention a few here. This
- 24 was the Midwifery Bill that would have actually
- 25 created a new, Dr. Johnson, I think, entity,

- 1 right, to regulate midwifery? That bill did
- 2 not pass, but it was introduced. It died. It
- 3 was Senate Bill 2080. Of course, we know
- 4 Senator Blackwell's Bill on the FPA was Senate
- 5 Bill 2377. Representative Scoggin's FPA bill
- 6 was House Bill 821. One that I think everybody
- 7 should pay attention to is House Bill 1640. I
- 8 call it the "omnibus mental health bill." It's
- 9 very important. It addresses several aspects
- 10 in our mental healthcare system:
- One, my lawyer friend here will
- 12 appreciate, is civil commitments. It's looking
- 13 at the commitment process. And, you know, now,
- 14 someone -- if an interested person, say a
- 15 family member, takes someone -- they go to the
- 16 Chancery Clerk's Office, you know, and they try
- 17 to get a writ ordered for the sheriff to pick
- 18 them up and have them examined, one of the
- 19 things this bill would do would be a
- 20 pre-screening prior to the commitment process,
- 21 where they have one of those crisis
- 22 intervention teams or one of the community
- 23 health centers, they would go and try to
- 24 evaluate this person prior to an actual
- 25 commitment. The thought being, "If we can have

- 1 an alternative or divert them from that
- 2 process, then we're helping a patient." And we
- 3 don't want sick or mentally ill people in jail,
- 4 right, locked up in jail?
- 5 And that's been a big problem because we
- 6 just haven't had the beds and the facilities,
- 7 so a lot of these people, out of necessity, not
- 8 discretion, have been placed in county jails.
- 9 So it's not good for the patient or the sick
- 10 person, it's not good for the county. I can
- 11 tell you the sheriffs, they don't want --
- 12 they're not trained for that. So this bill
- 13 attempts to address some of those issues, so I
- 14 thought it was -- merited mentioning.
- They're working on some things with hemp
- 16 and cannabis. It looks -- there's a bill
- 17 afoot. I think it looks like it's going to
- 18 pass -- it's still in process -- that would --
- 19 you know, when you go to the gas station, of
- 20 course, you see a lot of things for sale in the
- 21 gas station, kratom, CBD oil, I mean,
- 22 everything. And I've been told some of those
- 23 things, maybe not necessarily the two I
- 24 mentioned, but there are some things that are
- 25 technically illegal that are being sold in

- 1 places that they should not be sold, and they
- 2 have quite an intoxicating effect. To me,
- 3 that's kind of a polite word for it, probably.
- 4 So with this bill, they're wanting to move
- 5 some of the cannabis things. I don't think
- 6 it's like CBD oil. But some of the edibles or
- 7 whatever, they're wanting to require those to
- 8 be sold in a dispensary, a cannabis dispensary.
- 9 You kind of have two sections in the
- 10 dispensary, one would be hemp based and the
- 11 other. And they got into this big discussion
- 12 about THC levels and what is acceptable and
- 13 what's not. And there's really no testing on
- 14 the hemp and that kind of thing. So there's
- 15 been a lot of discussion on that. That's House
- 16 Bill 1676.
- I mentioned this bill to you earlier. It
- 18 did not pass, but there was a Senate Bill 2070
- 19 with nurse practitioners authorized to dispense
- 20 legend drugs to patients.
- 21 And I think, if I'm correct, Dr. Johnson,
- 22 under federal law, that requires a
- 23 prescription; is that right? I think that's
- 24 correct.
- 25 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: (Nods

- 1 head affirmatively).
- 2 MR. BOBINGER: But that bill was
- 3 dropped. Again, that's related back to the
- 4 cannabis, you know, to conform the Cannabis
- 5 Act was the intent of it.
- I know this is something that the Board
- 7 leadership, Shan, I know you and Dr. Johnson
- 8 and some of the Board members have been very
- 9 interested in workforce training. Obviously,
- 10 we have our own Office of Workforce Training
- 11 for the Board of Nursing. This House
- 12 Bill 1129, -- and it's still going -- it would
- 13 transfer the Office of Mississippi Workforce
- 14 from UMC to the State Department of Health, so
- 15 it would move that. And I think the parties,
- 16 Dr. Johnson, have agreed upon that, I think.
- Now, this other bill we ended up having a
- 18 lot of discussion about, Senate Bill 2860,
- 19 Medication Aide Act, A-I-D-E. This is where
- 20 you would have someone that could be hired with
- 21 like -- 12, was it -- Phyllis, I'm trying to
- 22 remember -- six hours of training? Twelve? I
- 23 mean, it was not much. But they could actually
- 24 inject people with insulin, and they could
- 25 administer an inhaler. And I'm going -- just

- 1 with bare minimum training.
- 2 And there was kind of a push behind that
- 3 because these personal care homes -- I guess
- 4 that would include what I call "assisted
- 5 living" as well, I assume. I understand it's a
- 6 money thing. You follow me? They would rather
- 7 hire somebody at \$12 an hour, whatever, -- I'm
- 8 picking that number -- rather than having an
- 9 LPN or an RN or someone else. But you folks
- 10 understand that you're bringing -- I don't care
- 11 if it's a blister pack or not. You're taking
- 12 that medication to those patients, but you're
- 13 talking about injections and things.
- 14 Like I said, there was a back-and-forth on
- 15 this with the folks. And, like I said, I
- 16 understand the business side of it. But, you
- 17 know, as Dr. Johnson is always saying, you
- 18 know, our priority is patient safety and doing
- 19 things to protect the public. So that bill
- 20 died. It did not pass, but I wanted you to
- 21 know that there's kind of a lot going on with
- 22 that bill.
- And, then, they've got another bill on
- 24 cannabis where they really tried to expand it
- 25 on advertising and all this. That got shot

- 1 down. But I think they're going to do some
- 2 things on background checks and fees and
- 3 appeals and that kind of thing.
- 4 You know, there's a bill that I know some
- 5 people -- y'all are familiar. There's this
- 6 class of what we call "rare diseases." And
- 7 they don't happen a lot, but they're horrific
- 8 for those families and members that do. This
- 9 bill had been dropped several years, and I
- 10 think it's going to pass into law this year. I
- 11 think it may be on the way to the Governor.
- 12 The Mississippi Rare Disease Advisory Council
- 13 created Senate Bill 2156, and I think it's
- 14 going to be housed at UMC.
- But they're going to study and gather data
- 16 and that kind of thing about rare diseases. I
- 17 think they'll make a report to the legislature
- 18 and, perhaps, the Department of Health and
- 19 other entities. And some of these families
- 20 that are impacted with children or adults,
- 21 quite frankly, have been pushing for this just
- 22 to bring a focus and a light on rare diseases.
- 23 So I think that's something that is a good
- 24 thing. And, you know, there again, we're
- 25 pushing along, hopefully, helping people that

- 1 are sick or having medical issues.
- 2 The last thing I'll mention is House
- 3 Bill 1803. That is our appropriation bill.
- 4 Shan and I have talked, and I -- again, I would
- 5 be remiss without thanking Shan for all of her
- 6 hard work on that budget, so I thank Shan and
- 7 all your -- I can text her and say, "Look, can
- 8 you get me a one-pager? I know you sent me a
- 9 two-pager, but can you get me a one-pager?",
- 10 and, bam, it's there. And I appreciate that.
- 11 Y'all know it's like wrestling with a bear
- over there when you get to money and money
- issues, and I can see the effect. You know,
- 14 the ARPA money, most of it has gone away. Now,
- 15 there's still a pot out there, but it's nothing
- 16 like what we had the last two or three years.
- 17 So things -- and then you've got PERS.
- 18 Y'all are all familiar with the Public
- 19 Employees Retirement System issue, which I'm
- 20 sure there are going to be -- there will end up
- 21 being a large appropriation made to shore up
- 22 the PERS fund.
- 23 So funds are -- general funds are tighter,
- 24 and there's a mentality, I think, at the
- 25 Capitol about watching dollars closer. But our

- 1 bill is scheduled to go to conference, so we've
- 2 got some more time to work on it. And we'll
- 3 continue to work on that and with Dr. Johnson,
- 4 Shan, and other staff, and certainly any of the
- 5 Board members to see what we can do to make
- 6 sure we have the adequate resources here for
- 7 this Board to carry out its duties and
- 8 responsibilities.
- 9 So with that, I'll end my presentation.
- 10 If anyone's got any questions?
- 11 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Does anybody
- 12 have any questions for Mr. Bobinger?
- BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: So the Rare
- 14 Diseases Committee Council, did they
- 15 appropriate funds for that, or did they --
- MR. BOBINGER: No. That's a great
- 17 question. Thank you, Dr. Stewart, for asking
- 18 that.
- What they did initially is, they've
- 20 created it. They've given them authority. I've
- 21 been told there's already a benefactor who's
- 22 willing to make some contributions. I don't
- 23 know that for a fact. That's what I was told.
- 24 But it said they could accept donations or
- 25 receive funds.

- 1 What I would like to see, if they start
- 2 really meeting and gathering data, then you can
- 3 take that and go to the legislature and say,
- 4 "Okay. We're carrying out our duties and
- 5 responsibilities. Give us some State funds to
- 6 support it." So I think that's kind of the
- 7 idea. It's got to be self-sufficient at this
- 8 point with private donations. But I think if
- 9 it works like it should, then I think the
- 10 legislature later would probably be open to
- 11 funding it.
- BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I was just
- 13 curious. Thanks.
- 14 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any other
- 15 questions?
- 16 ASST. ATTORNEY GENERAL MS. TURNER:
- 17 Trey, do you have an update on Senate
- 18 Bill 2799, the reconstitution of all of the
- 19 Boards that went back to the Senate for
- 20 conference?
- MR. BOBINGER: Yes, I do. I was on the
- 22 phone with Representative Randy Boyd on that
- 23 very bill this morning. I've spoken to
- 24 Representative Zuber, Hank Zuber, who has
- 25 that bill in this Committee. The bill --

- 1 thank you for asking that question.
- 2 That is the bill dealing with the
- 3 appointment of all State agency Board members
- 4 and something we've never seen before, an every
- 5 four-year confirmation of every executive
- 6 director, which, to me, that obviously has
- 7 always been a prerogative of a Board, you know,
- 8 whether it's Board of Nursing, Board of Medical
- 9 Licensure, whomever. So we've never had that.
- 10 That would be a new wrinkle if that stays in
- 11 the bill.
- Now, the bill as currently proposed -- and
- 13 it's going to conference -- would come into
- 14 effect in 2028, so there would be a four-year
- 15 delay period there. But, nonetheless, at that
- 16 point, it would still have an impact.
- 17 The other thing is geographical diversity
- is supposedly one of the purposes behind the
- 19 bill, meaning they want, like, so many from the
- 20 Southern, Central, Northern Supreme Court
- 21 Districts to try to ensure that various areas
- 22 of the State are adequately represented.
- One thing we've been sensitive to is, we
- 24 want to keep high quality, right, our standards
- 25 and qualifications up? You know, on this

- 1 Board, most of -- many of our appointees are
- 2 recommended by nursing -- professional nursing
- 3 organizations or associations. And, you know,
- 4 there's been some of our folks that want to
- 5 keep that in place, and other Boards. We're
- 6 not the only one that has a similar system.
- 7 Some don't, but some do.
- 8 So it sort of depends on -- you know, some
- 9 folks are for just a straight-out appointment;
- 10 some would rather somebody make a
- 11 recommendation. But I just wanted to mention
- 12 that was in there. And I'm trying to remember.
- 13 But, basically, it would be a reconstituting of
- 14 the way the current system is done.
- Now, like our Board members, obviously,
- 16 you have to be -- do the advice and consent
- 17 from the Senate once you're appointed by the
- 18 Governor. Some Boards, believe it or not, do
- 19 not even require -- all Boards do not require
- 20 that. So for some Boards, it's not just the
- 21 Executive Director, but it would be the actual
- 22 Board itself, their membership. But that's not
- 23 a change for us. It would not be a change for
- 24 this Board. But I think a lot of agencies,
- obviously, are interested in the bill and are

- 1 watching it. We'll see what happens in
- 2 conference.
- 3 I know Representative -- or Chairman Zuber
- 4 has been open to discussing any particular
- 5 issues we may have with our language in the
- 6 bill, so that's encouraging. So we'll continue
- 7 to look at that.
- But, yes, it's headed to conference, and
- 9 it appears to have leadership support on both
- 10 sides. So it's not just some bill floating. I
- 11 mean, it -- I think it's an intentional bill,
- 12 so...
- 13 BOARD MEMBER MR. CASTILLA: I have a
- 14 question about Medicaid Expansion
- 15 Legislation.
- 16 MR. BOBINGER: Yes, sir.
- 17 BOARD MEMBER MR. CASTILLA: From a
- 18 calendar standpoint in time, what are the
- 19 drop-dead dates in terms of final action on
- 20 that?
- 21 MR. BOBINGER: That's a good question.
- 22 On paper -- you know, we always laugh and say
- 23 that on paper, signing dye, you know, the
- 24 last day is May the 5th. But all indications
- 25 are they're really trying to get out a little

- 1 early. In fact, Speaker White, I think,
- 2 today said -- you know, a lot of times
- 3 they'll do a designated weekend for
- 4 appropriation rather than bill. He's wanting
- 5 to do that more during the week and speed
- 6 that process up.
- 7 I was watching Lieutenant Governor
- 8 Hosemann today, and he kept admonishing and
- 9 encouraging his Chairmen, "Submit your names
- 10 for your conferees on your bills that are going
- 11 to conference." So I'm seeing -- now, that
- 12 doesn't mean it will happen.
- Normally, on the Conference Committee,
- 14 like on Medicaid, you could run close to the
- 15 end of April. I don't have the calendar in
- 16 front of me, but you could go probably right
- 17 near the end of April. So what's today? The
- 18 12th, maybe; is that right?
- 19 So at least two and a half weeks probably,
- 20 close to it. But I've got a feeling that it's
- 21 going to be compressed, the time period will.
- 22 But there's still some time there, and I figure
- 23 that will be one of the -- if they get a bill,
- 24 it will be one of the last bills.
- 25 BOARD MEMBER MR. CASTILLA: One of the

- 1 last ones?
- 2 MR. BOBINGER: Yes, sir, it will be one
- 3 of the last ones, so...
- 4 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any other
- 5 questions for Mr. Bobinger?
- 6 MR. BOBINGER: I have one comment, if I
- 7 may. I think when our Assistant AG gets
- 8 coffee next time, she needs to bring
- 9 everybody a Starbucks. I think that's
- 10 unfair.
- 11 All right. Thank y'all very much. I
- 12 appreciate it.
- PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 14 Mr. Bobinger.
- Next, we're going to move forward with
- 16 just a reminder for the Board of Directors'
- 17 Retreat. It will be May 7th, 8th, and 9th,
- 18 with a reception occurring on the 7th and
- 19 two days of education, which I will say is
- 20 going to be a great educational opportunity for
- 21 all of us.
- Next, I'm going to ask Dr. Burks for the
- 23 Office of Nursing Workforce report.
- DR. BURKS: Good morning. From the
- 25 Office of Nursing Workforce, first, I'll

- 1 start with ONW Advisory Board Committee.
- 2 That's a voluntary Committee that consists of
- 3 ten members, and their purpose is to advise
- 4 and assist the Office of Nursing Workforce.
- 5 Currently, there are six members whose term
- 6 will expire June 2024, and we are actively
- 7 seeking individuals who will be an asset to
- 8 the Advisory Board. And as of the 10th, we
- 9 had four applications. I received some
- 10 information yesterday that there are a couple
- 11 more individuals that are considering
- 12 submitting for a position on the Advisory
- 13 Committee. So if you know of anyone, please
- 14 submit their information. The deadline for
- 15 submission is April 26th, 2024.
- 16 Also, in ONW, the first newsletter was
- 17 published, and that was on March the 8th. That
- 18 newsletter is currently on the ONW webpage.
- 19 And we did receive positive feedback from
- 20 stakeholders as well as the nursing community
- 21 about the ONW newsletter. They thought it was
- 22 very informative. They thought it was well put
- 23 together, and they're looking forward to more
- 24 newsletters from ONW the future.
- 25 Also, with the ONW student nurse retention

- 1 scholarships, we had three that graduated in
- 2 February; two will graduate in May of 2024; two
- 3 also finished their work service agreements in
- 4 February; we had two that finished in January;
- 5 and three that finished their service
- 6 agreements in December.
- 7 Also, in the Office of Nursing Workforce,
- 8 they've been participating in community
- 9 outreach. They participated in the Health Fair
- 10 at Mississippi Delta Community College; it was
- 11 also Mississippi Delta Community College and
- 12 their Advisory Committee as well. And they
- 13 were very appreciative of the Board attending
- 14 and participating because they said this was
- 15 the first time that they had the Board out to
- 16 their school, so they were excited about that.
- 17 Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College's
- 18 Career Fair is April of 2024, and they were
- 19 also very appreciative.
- In terms of the ONW nursing program
- 21 scholarships, there were over \$800,000
- 22 distributed to the schools. And there are some
- 23 letters of appreciation, and they are attached
- 24 to the document that you received. The
- 25 schools, as well as the students, they are very

- 1 appreciative of the funding that they receive
- 2 through the scholarship program. And for many
- 3 of these students, it is a game-changer. It
- 4 assists them. It helps them to go to that next
- 5 level, and it also encourages and helps them to
- 6 reach their goal of becoming nurses.
- We are in the process of reviewing the
- 8 schools' accountability forms because the
- 9 schools are responsible for submitting the
- 10 names, the amount that each individual
- 11 received. We will have a preliminary outcome
- 12 report and that will be available in July, and
- 13 that report will include the actual -- the
- 14 total number of students from each discipline
- 15 that received their scholarships, their NCLEX
- 16 outcomes, and those who are licensed in
- 17 Mississippi. It will be a preliminary report
- 18 because students will be graduating in May.
- 19 There will be some that will possibly have
- 20 taken boards at that time. So, hopefully, in
- 21 the fall, we will have a finalized report for
- 22 the Board's review.
- The MnVP, they are steady with the number
- 24 of participants that are in that program. I
- 25 want to thank the project manager, Casey Loper.

- 1 She has done a wonderful job in facilitating
- 2 and monitoring the current participants in that
- 3 program. And Casey, she has been visible and
- 4 out in the community. She was a vendor at the
- 5 addiction conference in February. She's going
- 6 to be attending the NOAP in May and also a part
- 7 of the Mental Health Awareness Day in June.
- 8 And Casey, she will speaking at an upcoming
- 9 event hosted by MNA. That's going to be in
- 10 North Mississippi on April the 26th.
- And that is the end of my report for the
- 12 Office of Nursing Workforce.
- 13 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 14 Dr. Burks.
- Do we have any questions for her?
- 16 (No response)
- DR. BURKS: And Ms. Montgomery, she
- 18 pulled up the newsletter.
- 19 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Well,
- 20 Dr. Burks, I would like to say I believe
- 21 collectively we appreciate your efforts, and
- 22 this looks fantastic. And I really love that
- 23 we've received these letters. I think that's
- 24 really important. So thank you.
- Next, moving on to the practical nursing

- 1 educational report from Dr. Burks.
- DR. BURKS: From the practical nursing
- 3 side, I'll start with an application. Blue
- 4 Cliff College, they have resubmitted their
- 5 self-study with corrections of the
- 6 standards/criteria that they were found to be
- 7 noncompliant. Last year, Blue Cliff actually
- 8 submitted an application to start a new
- 9 program in Mississippi. And the site visit
- 10 team is currently in the process of reviewing
- 11 that revised report. Once they have
- 12 completed reviewing that report, we will
- 13 submit a date to go out and do another site
- 14 visit to at Blue Cliff. And they are located
- 15 in the coastal area.
- Also, the accreditation schedule is coming
- 17 up for the year 2024. This will be the first
- 18 time under the purview of the Mississippi Board
- 19 of Nursing that accreditation site visits will
- 20 occur. As you can see, we have four visits
- 21 scheduled for this year.
- 22 And in addition to preparing the schools
- 23 for the accreditation visits, the Board hosted
- 24 a virtual accreditation training for the PN
- 25 directors, staff, and faculty on April the 4th.

- 1 That training was a success. And the next
- 2 training is scheduled for April 16th, 2024.
- And, also, the practical nursing program
- 4 director has been participating in different
- 5 conferences: You'll see the Mississippi LPN
- 6 Association Convention that was held this week;
- 7 we will be attending the Mississippi School of
- 8 Nursing Association Conference in June; the PN
- 9 Council Faculty Retreat also in June; and the
- 10 Community College Board CTE Conference in
- 11 Natchez, and that will be August of 2024.
- 12 And that is the end of my report for
- 13 practical nursing.
- 14 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any questions
- 15 for Dr. Burks on the practical nursing
- 16 report?
- 17 (No response)
- 18 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 19 Dr. Burks, for your great work on that.
- Next, we're going to move to the
- 21 Director's Report, Dr. Johnson.
- 22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: Madam
- 23 President and Members of the Board, good
- 24 morning. I was trying to see if
- 25 Ms. Montgomery had my PowerPoint over there,

- 1 but you have a copy of it in your packet.
- 2 So you will see that we changed the report
- 3 a little bit. And going forward, the report
- 4 will look like this.
- 5 And this is an opportunity for us to
- 6 provide data, the metrics of what was done in
- 7 past Board meetings so that we can keep up with
- 8 that information and present that information
- 9 to our stakeholders and also to show how
- 10 diligently and efficiently the Board works to
- 11 fulfill the mission of public safety here at
- 12 the Board of Nursing, because you-all do a
- 13 great job and you work very hard.
- And that is also a testament to this week
- 15 where we had our Associate General Counsel,
- 16 Brandon Walker, who had to stand in the stead
- 17 and do the entire week due to some unforeseen
- 18 circumstances with our General Counsel. But I
- 19 must say that Brandon and the legal team did an
- 20 outstanding job, as well as the Board Panel
- 21 that was convened to review the multiple,
- 22 multiple number of cases that were brought
- 23 before the Board.
- 24 So I just want to thank the Board Panel
- 25 and thank my staff and Brandon and his staff

- 1 for the outstanding job that they have done
- 2 this week.
- 3 And as you will see the agenda on here,
- 4 basically, my report will include information
- 5 on that agenda. And I like the saying by Mark
- 6 Twain, "The secret of getting ahead is getting
- 7 started." So this is something new that we're
- 8 doing, but we're getting started and presenting
- 9 the information that needs to be brought to the
- 10 public's attention and to let you know how well
- 11 you're doing.
- 12 So we will go on to the next slide,
- 13 "Mission and Vision." As you know, we are here
- 14 to protect the public. We promote competence;
- 15 we collaborate; we innovate; we educate; and we
- 16 lead. We want to promote the interests of
- 17 nurses and offer forward-thinking guidance in
- 18 the healthcare workforce, but regulate the
- 19 nursing practice and education to ensure public
- 20 safety.
- 21 Updates. Operation Nightingale is still
- 22 ongoing. We are actively monitoring for any
- 23 schools and/or individuals associated with the
- 24 schools, and I'm happy to report that
- 25 Mississippi still has only had six nurses to

- 1 show up as a result of the FBI investigation or
- 2 Operation Nightingale. And those nurses have
- 3 been confirmed to have been educated
- 4 appropriately and received their nursing
- 5 degrees appropriately, and that report has been
- 6 forwarded to the appropriate authorities at the
- 7 FBI level.
- 8 Additionally, we had our first
- 9 administrative denial that you will be given
- 10 more information about when Madam President
- 11 does her report. That is a result of the
- 12 Fraudulent Schools Operation Nightingale
- investigation that will be presented to the
- 14 Board today.
- 15 I investigate all situations dealing with
- 16 Operation Nightingale firsthand, so they have
- 17 to come to me. I have affidavits and things of
- 18 that nature from the FBI. I have a direct
- 19 contact with the FBI. And so, it's still
- 20 ongoing. New schools are continuing to
- 21 develop.
- We get notification when those -- when the
- 23 FBI completes its investigation of any new
- 24 affidavits that come forward with any
- 25 information of any licensees that are in our

- 1 database.
- 2 And I must say that our ThoughtSpan system
- 3 has worked very well with us being able to
- 4 identify any licensees. I've asked for an
- 5 audit retrospectively to look back to make sure
- 6 that we don't have individuals that have
- 7 graduated from these schools that may have done
- 8 that prior to this investigation, and
- 9 ThoughtSpan has been very cooperative.
- 10 And our system has worked very well in
- 11 that we have been able to either identify and
- 12 make the appropriate changes in investigations
- or we have not had many that have graduated
- 14 from some of these schools. So that's a great
- 15 testament to the technology system that you-all
- 16 so graciously approved for us to have here at
- 17 the Board of Nursing.
- Board Visibility. We've been very
- 19 visible. You will see that the NCSBN
- 20 Governance Review Committee met last month.
- 21 Shan Montgomery is our Board staff that has
- 22 been appointed at the national level for that
- 23 Committee. It is a two-year Committee, and
- 24 it's a very important Committee, and it
- 25 requires a lot of hard work. I quess she can

- 1 attest to that. They will be very busy, but
- 2 it's very important in that they will be
- 3 reviewing the bylaws, articles of
- 4 incorporation, and making the necessary changes
- 5 at the national level.
- 6 We attended the midyear meeting. I would
- 7 like to highlight our Board member, Lacey
- 8 Gentry, soon to be Dr. Lacy Gentry. Have you
- 9 defended yet?
- 10 BOARD MEMBER MS. GENTRY: Nine days.
- 11 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: Nine
- 12 days. Okay.
- But she presented at the midyear meeting,
- 14 and it was on competency-based nursing and
- 15 education, and she did a phenomenal job. I
- 16 have had people come up to me wanting to know,
- 17 "Where did this person come from?"
- And I said, "Mississippi, the Sip."
- But they were just amazed at her
- 20 presentation, her knowledge. Philip Dickison,
- 21 the CEO of NCSBN, came up to me personally and
- 22 wanted to let me know how great a job she did.
- 23 She was very knowledgeable. And so, I've
- 24 gotten a lot of people to inquire about that.
- So, again, it's a testament to the skill

- 1 set of the Board members that we have here. So
- 2 I highly encourage other Board members to get
- 3 involved at the national level. You know I'm
- 4 all about, when the Committees come up, sending
- 5 out that information.
- 6 So Lacey is a rock star now. She'll
- 7 probably be called on to present at some other
- 8 national conferences, and I wouldn't be a bit
- 9 surprised if it goes international. So just be
- 10 on quard.
- 11 The APRN Roundtable. What's conducted
- 12 this week will be at the APRN Roundtable on
- 13 Monday. My topic was on IV hydration. I've
- 14 gotten a lot of questions from other entities
- 15 across the nation based on what we're doing
- 16 here in Mississippi because Mississippi is kind
- of looked at as one on the flagships of how to
- 18 investigate the IV hydration issue that is a
- 19 big issue nationwide, and not only nationwide,
- 20 but internationally. I've gotten questions
- 21 from New Zealand and Australia because they're
- 22 seeing this in their countries now, and they
- 23 don't know really how to handle it.
- So I'll give you guys the feedback from
- 25 the evaluation once it's received. But I've

- 1 got information from the National Council that
- 2 all of the responses have been very positive
- 3 and that the information has been very helpful.
- 4 And it shows how we can work together. We work
- 5 with the Board of Medicine; we work with the
- 6 Board of Pharmacy; and the Board of Nursing to
- 7 investigate these entities. And that
- 8 collaboration has been very, very effective.
- 9 So, again, a testament to you-all for your
- 10 leadership in that.
- 11 And the International Center for
- 12 Regulatory Scholarship Advanced Leadership
- 13 Institute was held in Washington, D.C., this
- 14 year. And I must say we want to congratulate
- our staff member, Dr. Rebecca Cagle, who
- 16 completed the Institute and received her
- 17 certification at this event. So we are very
- 18 proud of her for stepping up to the plate
- 19 because it does require some time and some
- 20 study to do that. But that, again, was a
- 21 testament to the kind of staff that we have
- 22 here at the Board of Nursing.
- Dr. Burks and I will be attending a spring
- 24 Advisory Board meeting at the Canton Career &
- 25 Technical Education Center. They reached out

- 1 to us to come and serve on a panel and ask
- 2 questions about career and technical education.
- 3 Again, that's a buzzword now that you're seeing
- 4 a lot about, and so we wanted to make sure that
- 5 nursing has a seat at the table. So they
- 6 reached out to us, and we'll be doing that, I
- 7 think, next week, I believe, the latter part of
- 8 April.
- 9 And upcoming meetings. You heard about
- 10 the retreat, so there's nothing more to say on
- 11 that. Vanessa Gray, my Executive Assistant,
- 12 will be sending out additional information
- 13 about that so that you are prepared and
- 14 accommodated to attend. And that will be at
- 15 the Westin.
- 16 Licensure Data. There's probably a little
- 17 bit more now than when I did this report last
- 18 week because it turns over every 24 hours.
- 19 But, as you can see, we're right at about
- 20 65,000-plus RNs and LPNs combined in the State,
- 21 and there's a breakdown of the advanced
- 22 practice nurses there for your review.
- 23 The licensures -- the licenses that we
- 24 monitor are much, much more than that. We're
- 25 at about 80,000-plus licenses that we are

- 1 responsible for because some of these people
- 2 have duplicate licenses that we have to
- 3 monitor.
- 4 Hearing Matters in February. Hearing
- 5 matters were 20; Letters of Concern were one;
- 6 six ASPs; we had 26 administrative affidavits;
- 7 and one administrative denial; and then one
- 8 cease and desist. That will probably be a lot
- 9 more at the next meeting based on all that was
- 10 done this past week. But I wanted to give you
- 11 this information to show you the kind of work
- 12 that you do each and every time you come for
- 13 the Board.
- 14 Investigations & CBC Actions. If you will
- 15 look at this, this is somewhat impressive to me
- 16 because it shows that we mailed 241 fingerprint
- 17 cards during that time period, which is about
- 18 roughly a month, and we had 251 in-person
- 19 fingerprints here at the Board. And at that
- 20 time, 87 new allegations came in during that
- 21 time period. And that's normally somewhat of
- 22 an average as far as allegations. So if you
- 23 multiply that times 12, you'll see how many
- 24 allegations normally come in. It's roughly an
- 25 average, but that's a lot.

- 1 Regulatory Updates Approved by the OLRC on
- 2 March 29th, 2024. And you can see those on
- 3 there: Part 2840, Part 2880, and Part 2820.
- 4 And the one that is not listed is Part 2825,
- 5 and that's the procedural one about the stays.
- 6 And, Brandon, I don't know if you want to
- 7 highlight what that says, basically.
- 8 BOARD ATTORNEY MR. WALKER: I can.
- 9 It was mainly about the appeals,
- 10 discipline being stayed. There was some
- 11 administrative affidavit language put in there,
- 12 administrative denial language put in there.
- 13 It was the same language that y'all approved,
- 14 but it went to the OLRC last Friday. So on
- 15 Good Friday, we had the pleasure of doing that.
- 16 So it all got approved, and we're waiting on
- 17 the resolution.
- 18 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: So all
- 19 of those have been approved by OLRC,
- 20 thankfully. And once we get the approval for
- 21 the resolution, then it will be implemented.
- 22 So thank you-all for that.
- 23 This is technology investments that we --
- 24 it's ongoing. All of these projects are
- 25 ongoing. And I must thank Shan for her hard

- 1 work. She's the liaison for technology, and
- 2 she is always getting the website updated and
- 3 trying to make it easier to navigate. She's
- 4 all into AI, and sometimes I have to tell her
- 5 to slow down because she's all into AI.
- 6 We have bot and bot videos created, and
- 7 they're on the website. And this is an
- 8 educational tool for our licensees. They like
- 9 that. And, again, the ThoughtSpan data reports
- 10 are updated. So this is ongoing, but these are
- 11 the things that we're doing here from a
- 12 technological standpoint.
- And going forward, we want to focus on the
- 14 key priorities. We will continue to fulfill
- our mission of protecting the public through
- 16 nursing regulation, and we could not do that
- 17 without your support. So thank you for that.
- 18 And that is the end of my report.
- 19 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 20 Dr. Johnson.
- 21 Are there any questions for Dr. Johnson?
- 22 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I have a
- 23 question, Madam President.
- 24 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Okay.
- 25 Dr. King.

- 1 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Dr. Johnson,
- 2 thank you for that report. I have a question
- 3 as to the breakdown of the disciplines and
- 4 the licensure data.
- Is there anything that we have currently
- 6 or have access to that you could break down
- 7 those investigations for APRNs and how many are
- 8 practice related, just for information moving
- 9 forward for our professional organizations or
- 10 legislators to understand what it looks like in
- 11 our current collaborative state?
- 12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: I can
- 13 look at that information. I can probably
- 14 delve into our database. Interestingly
- 15 enough, I had another conversation with one
- 16 of the other Board members similar to that
- 17 question.
- So I'll get with Dr. Burks, who is my
- 19 researcher, and we will delve into that and try
- 20 to get that information going forward.
- 21 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Thank you.
- 22 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I have just
- 23 one question just very quickly to clarify the
- 24 "Mission & Vision" that's here on this
- 25 handout.

- 1 Is this something we're going to be
- 2 discussing at the retreat, or is this restating
- 3 from something we already have?
- 4 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: This is
- 5 restating something that we already have.
- 6 Now, if you-all want to change that, we can
- 7 discuss that at the retreat.
- 8 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Okay. My
- 9 only comment is that these are pretty vaque,
- 10 particularly in response to regulating the
- 11 nursing practice and education. We don't
- 12 regulate all nursing education.
- 13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: Right.
- BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I just think
- 15 we need to probably be clear about that, that
- 16 we regulate --
- 17 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON:
- 18 Practical nursing.
- 19 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: -- practical
- 20 nursing and education just for clarity
- 21 because Mississippi is so different.
- 22 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: Oh,
- 23 yeah. Yeah.
- BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: That's it.
- 25 Thank you.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: Thank 1 2 you. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any other 3 4 questions for Dr. Johnson? 5 (No response) 6 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you, 7 Dr. Johnson. You do a great job for us. Moving forward, next is Board business. 8 9 The first thing we have is business meeting minutes from February 9th, 2024. 10 Would anyone like to make a motion to 11 12 accept them? 13 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I make a 14 motion we accept them. 15 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I'll second. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in 16 favor, say "aye." 17 18 BOARD PANEL: Aye. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any of those 19 20 opposed? 21 (No response) 22 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Anyone 23 abstain? 24 (No response) PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: It moves 25

forward. 1 2 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: May I ask a 3 quick question on the minutes? 4 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Sure. BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: I know there 5 was some brief conversation about having a 6 different structure of our minutes. 7 8 Have we gone anywhere with that? 9 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: We have had a discussion in the Executive Committee about 10 that, and we're looking to moving forward 11 12 with changing how we do that. 13 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: All right. 14 Thank you. 15 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: You're 16 welcome. The next thing is the full Board appellate 17 18 oral argument minutes from October 2nd, 2023. Would anyone like to make a motion? 19 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I make a 20 21 motion that we accept those minutes. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Is there a 22 23 second? BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I second. 2.4 25 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in

favor, say "aye." 1 2 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 3 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 4 (No response) PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? 5 6 (No response) 7 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: It will move forward. 8 On future meetings, the administrative 9 10 hearings and settlements are set for June 4th, 11 5th, and 6th, beginning at 8:30 a.m. On 12 June the 7th, the business meeting will occur 13 at 11:05 a.m. 14 The Panel for June will be Sandra Culpepper, Carly Walker, Janel Moody, and we 15 will have an APRN or an RN sitting for that as 16 well to be determined. 17 18 Any questions on that? 19 (No response) 20 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All right. 21 Moving forward to the Committee reports. 22 This morning from the Executive Committee, we only have one thing coming out. And it is 23 24 in regard --I'm sorry. Did I miss something? 25

(Confers with Board Member Mr. Cummins). 1 2 Coming out of the Executive Committee, we only have one item; and, that is, I move that 3 4 the Board adopt the Executive Committee's 5 recommendation to accept the following 6 administrative denial for Case No. 2024-0244 in 7 regards to an LPN exam application. Would anyone like to make a motion? 8 9 BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: I'll make a motion. 10 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I'll second. 11 12 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in 13 favor, say "aye." 14 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 15 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 16 (No response) 17 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? 18 (No response) PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: We will move 19 forward with that. And that will be the only 20 21 thing coming out of the Executive Committee. 22 Next, moving on to the Compliance 23 Committee. Ms. Norris-Johnson? 24 25 BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: Madam

- 1 President, I move that the Board adopts the
- 2 Compliance Committee recommendation that we

- 4 Affidavit 2; and, No. 2, we deny P-326356,

- 8 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Do I have a
- 9 second on that motion?
- 10 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I second.
- PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any
- 12 discussion?
- 13 (No response)
- 14 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in
- 15 favor, say "aye."
- 16 BOARD PANEL: Aye.
- 17 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed?
- 18 (No response)
- 19 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Anyone
- 20 abstain?
- 21 (No response)
- 22 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: It will move
- 23 forward.
- Is there anything further out of your
- 25 Committee?

- 1 BOARD MEMBER NORRIS-JOHNSON: No, ma'am.
- 2 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 3 Mr. Norris-Johnson.
- 4 Next, we're going to move to the Advanced
- 5 Practice Committee.
- 6 Dr. Stewart?
- 7 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: We don't have
- 8 any motions to come out of the Committee.
- 9 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 10 Dr. Stewart.
- 11 Next is the Practice Committee.
- 12 Ms. Clanton?
- BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: We have one
- 14 thing that we are bringing forward.
- Okay. So what we're going to bring
- 16 forward is after discussion with the Practice
- 17 Committee, it was decided to update the
- 18 position statement with reference to insertion,
- 19 maintenance, and removal of PICC lines by using
- 20 ultrasound. But, also, we want to reference
- 21 that they need to go to the decision tree to
- 22 also confirm any of the competencies that they
- 23 may have inquired about.
- 24 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Do I have a
- 25 second on that motion?

BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I'll second. 1 2 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any discussion? 3 4 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: Can I ask a question, Madam President? 5 6 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Yes. 7 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: For the position statements, are we still looking at taking 8 9 those position statements down? PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: We are 10 11 currently, within the Practice Committee, 12 reviewing because we do have a number of 13 people that still do look at these position 14 statements. So as a Committee, we are reviewing each one of them currently, and we 15 will come back to the table in June with our 16 recommendations currently at this time. 17 18 we are referencing the decision tree still. 19 Any other questions? BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Well, just to 20 21 tag along, I think I'm also trying to 22 clarify. If we are shifting to the decision tree, I'm trying to understand the need to 23 update the existing position descriptions 24 25 right now. I'm not opposed to it.

- 1 trying to understand why we would be revising
- 2 position statements if our move really is to
- 3 stop referring to them?
- 4 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: Well, with
- 5 this particular one, the position statement
- 6 is already out there. It is still on the
- 7 website. It's still out there. And it was
- 8 very specific to the confirmation was via
- 9 X-ray, and it was very specific to say this
- 10 is how it's going to be done, via X-ray. And
- 11 what they want to do is add the verbiage to
- 12 use the ultrasound, which is the standard
- 13 right now.
- BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Right.
- BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: So that's the
- 16 reason why we said we're going to go ahead
- 17 and approve that, where they can go ahead and
- 18 refer to that. But we do want to go back and
- 19 look at the position statements that are out
- 20 there because there are 18 or 19 that are
- 21 standing out there. And seeing the
- viability, "Do we need to pull them down?",
- or, "What's the viability? Why are they
- 24 still out there?" So we're going to go back
- 25 and look at each one individually.

BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Including the 1 2 one that we just updated? BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: Every one of 3 4 them. 5 BOARD MEMBER DR. STEWART: Okay. 6 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: And then like 7 making sure that there's not a, I guess, 8 discrepancy in the position statement versus the decision tree? 9 10 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: Exactly, make 11 sure there's no conflicts. Because, like I 12 said, they're still out there. People are 13 still looking at them. So it's still on the 14 website. So we've got to -- that's what they're looking at also. And there are 15 16 people, from what I've learned from Dr. Burks, that are looking at the decision 17 tree, too. This is coming from a facility, 18 and this is what they were citing. 19 20 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any other 21 questions? 22 (No response) 23 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in favor, say "aye." 24 25 BOARD PANEL: Aye.

PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: 1 Any opposed? 2 (No response) PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: 3 Any abstain? 4 (No response) It will move PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: 5 6 forward. 7 Is there any other further business from your Committee, Ms. Clanton? 8 9 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: Nothing else. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Next, we have 10 the Administrative Code. 11 12 Ms. Gentry? 13 BOARD MEMBER MS. GENTRY: Yes. I don't 14 have a report, but I do have a praise; and that is for the phenomenal Administrative 15 Code Committee that did so much great work 16 17 this year. 18 And, also, Ms. Saltzman and Mr. Walker, I know we are awaiting resolution from OLRC for 19 the Administrative Code revision, but I just 20 21 have just a huge and tremendous amount of 22 appreciation for the hours and hours of work that was put into this, not only by our 23 phenomenal legal team, but also by our 24 wonderful Committee. 25

- 1 So just a big "thank you" on the record,
- 2 please.
- 3 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 4 Ms. Gentry.
- 5 Next is the Finance Committee.
- 6 Mr. Cummins?
- 7 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I have a
- 8 report from the Finance Committee on the
- 9 fiscal year budget, the "Fiscal Year
- 10 '24 Budget and Expense Analysis." You have
- 11 the report in front of you, and I'm not going
- 12 to go real deep. I'll hit some high points
- 13 here; and, if you have questions, I'll be
- 14 happy to answer them.
- 15 Revenue collected through March was
- 16 \$2,290,400. Our total budget is \$5,062,992.
- 17 And our current purchase orders are sitting at
- 18 \$152,716.30. We have parked funds available at
- 19 \$18,232.37, and that would be fixed items, such
- 20 as insurance, work comp., DFA payments, so on
- 21 and so forth as far as that goes. Total
- 22 commitments to date is \$170,948.67. Our actual
- 23 expenses for the fiscal year are \$3,338,164.70.
- 24 And our current available remaining in the
- 25 fiscal budget total is \$1,553,878.63.

- 1 If you'll look at your breakdown under
- 2 "Salaries," we have expended about
- 3 49.95 percent of this budget. That's going to
- 4 be due to us having around -- well, not
- 5 around -- but having 14 openings within the
- 6 agency at the time. So the salary budget has
- 7 not been expended by any means.
- 8 As far as travel, we are slightly over on
- 9 travel at 76.14 percent. We still have about
- 10 two and a half months left in this fiscal year,
- 11 so I think we're going to be fine there. We
- 12 probably will see expending that entire budget,
- 13 though, by the end of the fiscal year.
- For commodities, we've expended 58 percent
- 15 of that budget. Capital out equipment is
- 16 sitting at 2.85 percent, which is greatly under
- 17 budget. That is a budget that we normally look
- 18 at towards the end of the fiscal year to see
- 19 what the needs are as far as electronic
- 20 replacement, so on and so forth. So that is
- 21 something that Ms. Montgomery is evaluating now
- 22 to see where expenses need to take place.
- As far as subsidies and loans, we're going
- 24 to be at 100 percent of that budget, meaning
- 25 that the amount will be fully utilized there.

- 1 In conclusion, our total expenses are
- 2 sitting at 72.65 percent of the budget, and
- 3 that shows that we're clearly managing our
- 4 expenses effectively. We are in good financial
- 5 standing with the Board, and we're able to
- 6 continue the work of the Board with available
- 7 cash at this time of \$6,774,465.17.
- If you go to page 2, you can see some
- 9 information on fiscal year '25. We have not
- 10 gotten approval for our fiscal year '25 budget
- 11 as of yet, but there are three main areas that
- 12 we were looking at for proposal that we hope to
- 13 get some feedback on, I guess you would say.
- We did look at some salary increases.
- 15 We've requested a one to four percent raise for
- 16 staff that did not get a raise in fiscal year
- 17 '24. We also are looking at a 10 percent raise
- 18 for all nursing staff and new recruits.
- 19 As far as staffing positions, as I
- 20 mentioned earlier, we have 14 open positions.
- 21 We are proposing to retain 41 of our current
- 22 positions and are open to losing one part-time
- 23 position that's got a pay rate of \$15,000, and
- 24 that would be a clerk position. So we're open
- 25 to giving that one up.

- 1 As far as Office of Nursing Workforce, we
- 2 continue to advocate for financial resources
- 3 for the ONW. We don't look to see -- we don't
- 4 expect to see an increase in that budget this
- 5 year, but we do have a projected plan going
- 6 into fiscal year '26/'27.
- 7 As far as other matters, the Board has got
- 8 a share of health insurance premiums that are
- 9 going to increase by \$18 a month. The
- 10 retirement benefits are projected to increase
- 11 by two percent. That bill died in Committee,
- 12 so we don't have to worry about that. The rate
- 13 for mileage reimbursement has increased from
- 14 65 cents to 67 cents per mile.
- So overall, we're in a good financial
- 16 state. The finances are sufficient to continue
- 17 the financial mission and purpose of the Board.
- I'm open to any questions if y'all have
- 19 any.
- 20 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Thank you,
- 21 Mr. Cummins.
- 22 May I get a motion to approve Mr. Cummins'
- 23 finance report?
- 24 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I make a motion.
- 25 BOARD MEMBER MS. GENTRY: I'll second.

PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: 1 Any 2 discussion? 3 (No response) 4 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in favor, say "aye." 5 6 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 7 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 8 (No response) 9 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? 10 (No response PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: The next thing 11 on the agenda is the Office of Nursing 12 13 Workforce Committee. 14 Ms. Clanton, do you have anything? 15 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: We do not 16 have anything today. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Under "Other 17 18 Committee Business," at this point, we are in April; and, therefore, we will be having 19 elections in June. So it's appropriate to 20 21 have a discussion about a Nominating Committee. 22 23 At this point, I would like to ask for any volunteers that would like to participate on 24 25 that Committee?

BOARD MEMBER MS. GENTRY: I'll gladly 1 2 participate on the Committee. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: 3 Thank you, Ms. Gentry. 4 5 Anyone else? 6 (No response) 7 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Typically, we 8 have three to four people that sit on this 9 Committee. So do I have any other volunteers that would like to --10 11 Yes, Dr. Johnson? EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MS. JOHNSON: I think 12 13 even though they're volunteers, there has to 14 be an election process according to the bylaws. I just wanted to make sure you --15 BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I'll nominate 16 17 Lacey Gentry as the director of this -- or 18 the chair of this Nominating Committee. BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: I'll second 19 20 that. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: All those in 21 22 favor, say "aye." 23 BOARD PANEL: Aye. 2.4 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 25 (No response)

PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? 1 2 (No response) 3 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any questions? 4 (No response). BOARD MEMBER MR. CUMMINS: I would like 5 to nominate Ms. Carly Walker to the 6 7 Committee. 8 Do you want us to get all of the nominations and then vote? 9 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Yes. Let's go 10 ahead and do the rest. 11 BOARD MEMBER DR. KING: I would like to 12 13 nominate Ms. Janel Moody. 14 BOARD MEMBER MS. CLANTON: I'll second 15 both nominations. 16 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: With that, all in favor, say "aye." 17 18 BOARD PANEL: Aye. PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any opposed? 19 20 (No response) 21 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: Any abstain? 22 (No response) 23 PRESIDENT MS. CULPEPPER: We will move forward with that Committee with Ms. Gentry 2.4 25 as Chair. Thank you.
